THE KING AND LAIMA BECK **GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL**

King and Laima Beck Girls High School is off to a great start!

The entire village celebrated the opening of our newest school with a joyous ceremony including raising the flags, dancing, and feasting on goat and other special dishes. As you may recall, this is the only all girls public high school in South Sudan. Classes began in February with 382 students filling the nine classrooms. Our interim principal will remain for another year after a female principal is hired to ensure a smooth transition. Six of the teachers are not from the village, therefore beds and sleeping spaces have been provided. There are also cooking pots and pans so that they can make meals there. It takes a village!







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The Laima Project Update

The first part of The Laima Project was the granting of \$500 to women who presented a simple business plan to a panel of three people. One of the first businesses was a restaurant which became very successful. Just this past winter, it was patronized by Doctors Without Borders and even the patients.

Through another aspect of The Laima Project, women have been given small garden plots. What once was hard, baked, barren soil is now farmland lush with tomato plants and many more crops. The gardens have grown in more ways than one and supply families with nourishing food while at the same time give women the opportunity to sell some of their crops at a market which then produces income for their families. It is truly miraculous.

It's an honour and privilege to register my heartfelt appreciation to Building Minds in South Sudan (BMISS) for constructing Ajong Primary School at a time when the community was in dire need of a modern school.

The ground-breaking ceremony was in early January 2012 for the foundation stone. This deeply brought back hope to the entire population in the area. Before BMISS, Ajong Primary School was an undertree school near a grass-thatched hut, a harsh environment that does not encourage pupils to keep to their studies. It was the worst situation ever to cope as rain and storms interrupted our lessons. Despite all this, we did not forgo schooling due to our resilience to survive with no other alternative. The community tried its best for so long, but at last used the grass-thatched hut school. It was much better than under-tree, but we still felt the helplessness given its conditions and limited capacity.

After BMISS intervened and successfully constructed Ajong Primary School, the environment became one that encouraged schooling. I'm extremely proud to be one of the products of Ajong Primary School.

I write this message and appreciate the entire leadership of BMISS in general and Sebastian Maroundit, president in particular, for the tireless support to the vulnerable population in the war-torn country, South Sudan. Words can never describe my happiness to the Americans who tirelessly support BMISS. You have humanity at heart, special thanks goes to you for your constant support.

In addition, the construction of Majok-Keen Girls' Primary School and Bill Cook High School add up to the tremendous achievements being made by BMISS.

As a product of Ajong Primary School, I currently study medicine at Ain Shams University, Cairo, Egypt. In my journey to becoming a medical doctor in the near future, I'm so determined to go back home and establish a clinic that would save lives of vulnerable mothers, children and the entire population. It will surely translate the meaning and importance of education to the community.
